DECORATIONS

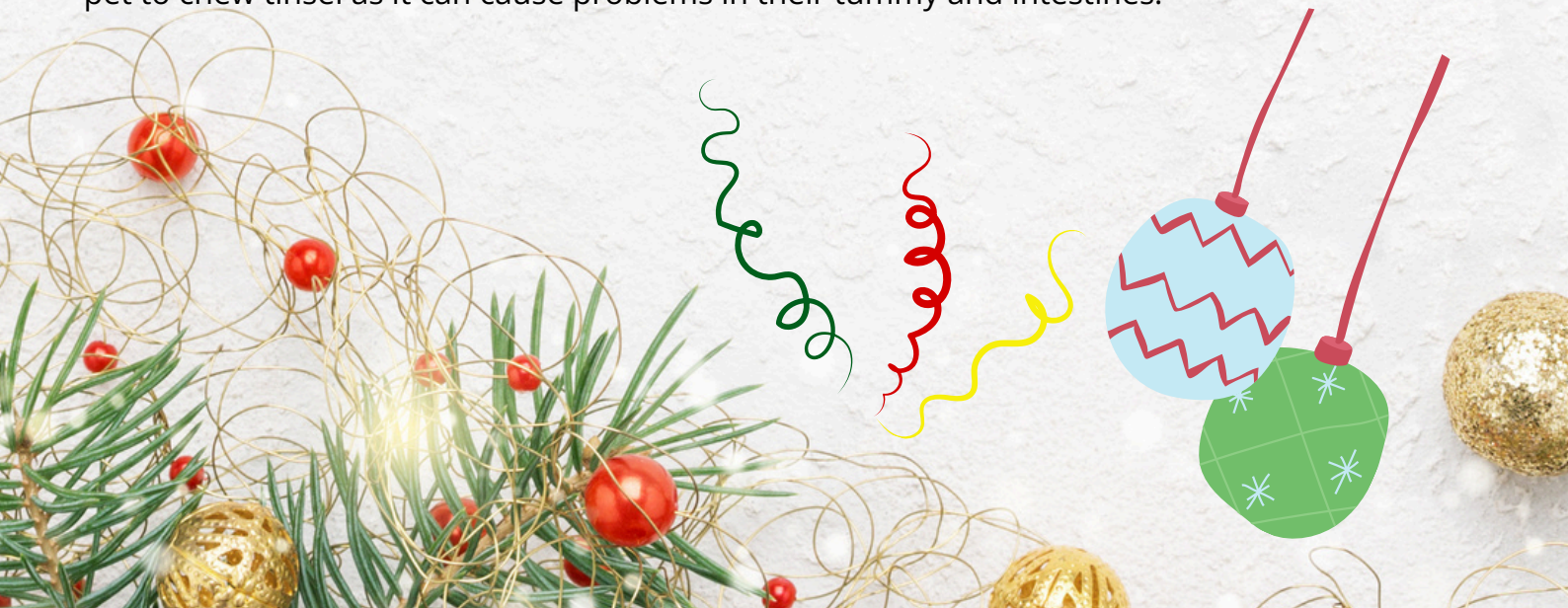

Baubles - baubles look like balls, which are lots of fun for cats and dogs to play with! And when they're hanging from a tree, they're even more tempting. But glass baubles can break, so hang them up high where possible.

Lights - if your pet is likely to chew things on your tree, don't use any lights. They can cause an electric shock if nibbled on and pets can get caught in them.

Tinsel - so sparkly and pretty, and very tempting to our curious companions! Don't allow your pet to chew tinsel as it can cause problems in their tummy and intestines.





FOOD – NAUGHTY OR NICE?

Christmas is definitely a time to indulge in lots of lovely food! So which foods are naughty for our pets?

On the naughty list - these foods can cause tummy upsets, injuries and some are toxic. So as much as you want to share with your pets, don't share any of these!

- Chocolate
- Raisins, sultanas and currants
- Onions and garlic
- Nuts
- Alcohol
- Bones - especially cooked bones
- Fatty food (certain meats)

- Poinsettia
- Holly
- Mistletoe
